1.	Welcome & introductions	Action by:
	 Due to the number of attendees, formal introductions were limited to first- time attendees. 	
2.	Confirmation of agenda

3.	Previous minutes

4.	Status of action items (none)	
	 There were no action items from the last meeting. 	
5.	Project Update and discussion	
	 a) Summary of recent and upcoming construction activity During the extended closure, piling work in right-of-way (ROW); work on canyon side; geotech investigations; temporary alignment & paving; rock scaling Recent work includes construction of crane trestles off ROW; access to upslope rock cuts. Upcoming work will include some blasting in July, excavation in the Dart Creek area; pile-driving 24/7 throughout the summer, rockfall attenuation and protection to prevent impact on CP Rail & for environmental protection. Some materials will be helicoptered in. Work during the next extended closure period in the fall will include piling, rockfall attenuation, traffic realignment, utility relocation, re-adjustment of buried cables, new and improved culverts, bridge construction, including girder placement. b) Traffic management - stoppages and closures Scaling - a safety issue as boulders and rocks are brought down in a controlled fashion 	

- Pavement repairs normally conducted during closures or SLAT periods.
- SLAT 8 p.m. 10 p.m. allows set-up for overnight and also for blasting in July; complies with previous commitments and design-build agreement (DBA).
- No daytime closures until Sept. 15
- Fall extended closure Sept. 20 Dec 1 at 6 am; with highway to be open on weekends through latter part of September and also Thanksgiving weekend.
- c) Takeaways from traffic management to date
- The pass system worked well. Community feedback was mostly positive; there were no issues with school buses or first responders getting through the construction site as needed.
- RCMP and Commercial Enforcement teams on the alternate route did a great iob.
- Traffic increase on the alternate route not as much as expected, largely due
 to COVID-related travel restrictions. As a result, the truck ratio was higher.
 While speeds were a concern, and there have been some notable exceptions,
 drivers were mostly compliant with limits.
- Wildlife incidents on alternate route were up, but were also up provincewide. Reduction of incidents on TCH would be an offset.

6. Round Table: issues, opportunities, considerations

- Item: Icons and descriptions on DriveBC are confusing to some travelers. It was explained that this is a result of older website architecture and the range of conditions it needs to convey. Opportunities for improvement are being explored. Best to use KHCP4 website calendar and Drive BC for latest info, versus 3rd-party sites that may not be reliable.
- Bighorn Sheep in Radium Hot Springs: Oversize signs and LED-lighted signs have been installed on 1-Mile Hill in Radium. Even when ministry vehicles are present with flashing lights, there are still some drivers who fail to slow down for sheep. Awareness messaging to be emphasized.
- There is concern over unsafe passing on the alternate route. However, double-lining the entire route would not result in more safety due to the increase in driver frustration and risk-taking. The emphasis is on ensuring passing opportunities are made as safe as possible. One location near Radium will become double-lined.
- There is also continuing apprehension over the approaches to the Kicking Horse Bridges in Golden, especially with some truck driver behaviour. This will continue to be monitored.
- Signage for local businesses on Golden Hill was discussed. Adding to the
 existing signage congestion is a problem, especially if all businesses are to
 be treated equally. Further discussion is to take place.
- It was suggested that, during stoppages, the westbound traffic consistently be held east of Yoho Bridge to reduce potential wildlife conflicts.
- It was suggested that consideration be given to installing wildlife
 exclusion fencing on both sides of the highway just west of the Yoho
 Bridge to reduce wildlife hazards and have animals become accustomed
 to the constraints.
- There is interest in whether the presence of sheep has necessitated construction stoppages. There has been at least one occasion in which construction activity has been interrupted by sheep presence.
- Item: COVID and vaccines update. Thanks to the community for their support!
- Item: Ktunaxa Nation Council has sub-contracted with Golden Rod & Gun Club to enhance Bighorn Sheep activity, which may help to inform construction processes.
